

Report card comments for kindergarte



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Effective communication between parents and the teacher is the cornerstone of effective parental involvement. Each progress report or report card gives teachers the opportunity to give parents an idea of their child's performance outside the letter or numerical score for behavior or academics. Teachers can, in turn, write thoughtful, engaging comments. However, it can be difficult to come up with fresh and positive ways to say things. So we're here to help! Here are some common situations that you may encounter in class and sample report card comments for each: Psst... get a free printed version of these comments by sending your email here. When the child is doing their best, but the parents expect more ... It is important to focus on the child's efforts in the comments, framing the positive. Use comments like: Your student comes to school every day ready to work. Your child is exceptionally focused and hard-working in his work. Your student is great for taking responsibility for your studies. Your student has a fantastic work ethic. Your child is a role model in the classroom. Your child regularly exceeds expectations. You can also write about your appreciation for the student to help parents see the child's work through your eyes: I love that your student is doing their best every day. I love how your child has invested in their learning. I appreciate your child's dedication to my class. Not only are your student strong academically they are the leader in the class. When the child has improved but is still behind ... In such cases, focus on improvement as well as providing momentum proposals. Try phrasing as: Your student has come so far in the subject! The next step is to focus on the important skill. What progress has your student made! They are still struggling with important skill, so this should be our next focus. If your student is as hard at working on important skill as they have worked on an improved subject, they will be caught for a long time! Hard work pays off! Let's keep it up when we start working on the next skill! Your student's perseverance is exemplary. When a child is meeting standards, but can be exceeding ... You want to stay positive, but still express higher expectations. Use comments like: Your student understands the material well. Let's find a way to help them shine. Your child has the potential to be at the top of the class. With a little more effort, your child can move to the front group in a subject where effort is lacking. Your child puts in a great job in the preferred subject! If they apply these skills to a non-preferred subject, they do not Let's work on your student's motivation to reach their potential. When the child is behind and lacks effort ... It is often difficult to tell the cause and effect in such situations, but parents can often help you get to the bottom of it if you notify them. Be specific in areas in these comments and do not be afraid to ask for help from parents. Here are some ideas: Your student seems to be lagging behind in the subject. Please get them to learn skills for time every night. Your student has not mastered specific skill. Sessions review available timing. Your student may need additional help with a skill/subject. Completing classes and homework is the first step to improvement. Your student needs additional practice with specific skill. Please make sure they complete their homework every night. We will continue to focus on strengthening your student's positive efforts. When a child doesn't turn to work at all and you're worried... The biggest lack of effort is when the child does not wind down in any work that will be evaluated. This situation is extremely difficult to handle with the comment report card. Write something positive about the child's identity by requesting a parent meeting or a phone call. Some examples: Your student is always respectful, but I am concerned about their work. When are we going to meet? Your child is inquisitive and engaged in class, but they have quite a few missing jobs. Please call me to discuss some strategies. Your child has a wonderful sense of humor/ is helpful/is kind, but does not turn in their tasks. Let's meet to come up with a plan to fix it. Let's work on strategies that will help your student complete their assignments. When you are experiencing behavioral problems and difficulties in the classroom ... Most parents want to know how their child behaved, even if they are not surprised by the behavior. Behavior can be even harder to write than academics. Be careful to make word comments so that it refrains from personal attacks or statements that may make a parent or child feel judged. For complex behavior, stick to statistics and/or basic descriptions. Try things like this: Your student is struggling with insert desired behavior here. We will continue to work on this behavior at the school. The main problem is behavior when your student inserts UNDESIRABLE behavior here. We will continue to strengthen appropriate behaviour. Your student has exhibited UNDESIRABLE Behavior (this is many times) times this quarter. Let's work to reduce the frequency of such behavior to target times. When your student is focused, they are nice to have in class. Let's meet to discuss strategies to keep them back on track. If you have wonderful, positive things to say... Positive behavior deserves as much (if not more) attention as negative behavior. These comments may be the most interesting to write. One of the key features is to make the comment personal. You can start with a simple stem and just fill in the personal details, will make the parents smile. Some examples of snack offerings: Teaching your child is always an adventure! I love it when they ... Your child makes the class a brighter place. They often ... Your student's behavior is exemplary. They... It's the joy of teaching yours I can always count on ... Your child is not only a strong student, but also a wonderful person. While all of these comments can complement the information ratings on the report card, you don't have to wait to use them. Sending notes home between progress reports and reporting cards with few comments as this can strengthen the relationship between parent and teacher. Available in word format. Kindergarten - Mathematics Comments 1. The issue is still not able to count beyond 20. Since this is the basic standard, we need to work more closely with your child to make sure that he/she is learning these skills. You can help him/her master this skill by incorporating math into your playing time at home, and his/her count more fun items such as small snacks or cards. 2. Your child confuses the terms side by side, between and below. You can help him understand this concept by using soft toys, and placing them according to the positional word you want to demonstrate. Books that focus on positions can also be helpful. 3. - shows great progress in mathematics. He/she is beginning to understand the time-related terminology, and is finally able to really tell the time! It's cool! 4. It is difficult for him to distinguish between a circle and a triangle. Do your child identify the shapes in your travels and play a form of drawing and counting games that focus on these two forms. We need to see improvement with practice. Kindergarten - Comments on language arts 1. Your child does a fantastic job recognizing popcorn or high-frequency words. Use the popcorn cards that we sent home to continue to build on this skill, which will be a huge help in improving his/her reading skills. 2. Continues to skip steps or mix order when retelling stories. He/she should pay attention when reading or listening to stories. One way to promote more concentrated reading is to read in a quiet place without distractions. Do your child provide you with a sequence of events when you do daily reading assignments. 3. I am concerned that Kew is not in a position to write his last name in full. He/her practice is writing and identifying each letter in the name until he/she can do so without help. 4. Books is his/her specialty! We may have an aspiring author here. Continue to provide him/her supplies to make books during the summer. By the end of the summer, Kew may have its own library of literary works! Writing is an important skill skill he/she will also

develop in first grade. Kindergarten - Behavior Comments 1. Your child is a joy to have in class. He/she is an excellent student with above-average behavior. 2. Arguing with other students has become the norm for your child. I ask you to talk to him/her and let's work together to find more positive ways to channel his/her frustrations. 3. The question is very manner and has been recognized by other teachers on our wing for being so respectful. He/she is a model student. 4. Unfortunately, I found that I had difficulty following the rules and directions. When asked to do a specific task, he/she will hesitate before performing and often refuses to do what he has been told. I haven't issued an official warning so far, but if this behavior continues, I'll have to escalate this until the behavior improves. Kindergarten - Science Comments 1.
